Green Chalice News You Can Use: Thinking of new Christmas decorations? Consider buying LED Christmas lights. Home Depot is running a promotion through November 15 giving a discount on new LED lights when you trade in your old incandescent light strings. Discount varies depending on which LEDs are purchased and is limited to 5 strings. Although their initial price may seem steep, LED lights use 1/3 the energy of incandescent mini-lights and and 1/100 of traditional C7 or C9 lights. These energy savings can equal the initial purchase cost over the course of just 4 seasons. Additionally, LED lights are difficult to break, won't burn out or get hot, and last up to 20 years. Once again, Green Chalice will accept Christmas lights and extension cords for recycling. Look for the collection bin in the Communion Preparation Room.

Minister's Message:

It certainly was good to be back with you on Sunday after our trip to Italy and Spain. What a warm welcome we received. Thank you for your expression of concern. I also was so pleased with our large attendance on Sunday morning and the delicious dinner and interesting program that followed. Our Outreach Committee should receive our highest accolades. This Sunday we will share some thoughts regarding Veteran's Day. Throughout the course of our nation, from the Revolutionary War, through the War of 1812, the Indian Wars, the Mexican War, the Civil War, the Spanish American War, the Two World Wars, Korea, Vietnam, right through the Gulf War, Somalia, up through Afghanistan and Iraq over 43 million men and women have served our country in the Armed Forces. Today there are over 26 million Veterans living among us who have answered our nation's call to military duty. We will never be able to thank these people, over half of them have entered into the larger life. Who are these veterans? Where did they come from?

Rev. Edward Harrison, Rector of St. Paul's Cathedral, San Diego, California provides a meaningful insight: "They came off the farms and out of the cities. They came from colleges and universities...and from the bread lines and unemployment lines. They came from the mansion...and from the servants quarters. They came...white, black, red, yellow: some with Polish names, Italian names, Jewish names, Russian names, African names, English names, Arabic names. Some came early in the day, some came at mid-day, some came late in the afternoon. It doesn't matter. They answered the call from every quarter and every section of our American life because they shared this nation's vision of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. They answered the call and their lives were forever changed."

Each of them served honorably and faithfully in their day, and a grateful nation remembers. See you Sunday as our sermon will be entitled, "On Behalf of a Grateful Nation."
